

Lastly, I want to thank Peter Graves for stepping up to be our president next year. Please give him your support throughout 2020.




CHARTER MASTER'S REPORT

I have been working on our Club's Charter Schedule for the coming seasons and starting with December, we do have a 1.5-day charter to start with, departing on Wednesday December 4th at 6PM and returning on Friday the 6th at around 6 or 7 AM. The charter is limited to 16 Anglers and the cost is only \$292. Weather permitting we will be going out to the Cortez Bank area. This is where we start our Rock-Cod charters, however you never know what could be out there, maybe some Tuna or Yellowtail still? I still have a couple of spot open so please call me at 760-450-7060 to get on this charter and support your club.

After our December Club meeting & after a small break for lunch I will be holding our yearly Charter Master Training Course. Remember to be considered to be a Charter Master for this coming year you must attend the Charter Master Training Course and be certified by Marshall Goddard's CPR & AED course that follows. With the AED & CPR course you must be signed up prior and have paid your fee for his course, the fee is paid to Marshall directly. I wish you and your families a very Merry Christmas.

CONSERVATION

This week the sportfishing community achieved a significant win by halting further consideration of a non-sustainable and destructive gear for authorization. Pacific Fisheries Management Council (PFMC) members were greeted by the sportfishing community, which came out in droves to oppose a measure on the meeting's agenda. The primary issue was consideration of authorizing shallow-set longline gear outside of the exclusive economic zone (EEZ).

While we support sustainable fishing practices in all sectors, industrial pelagic longlining has an abhorrent record of wasteful bycatch and unsustainability. This practice contravenes our collective goals of reducing bycatch and ensuring quality fishing opportunities for the future.

Public comment on this issue included nearly 50 separate submitted comments from the sportfishing community, conservation groups, tribal entities, and the general public and more than 500 postcards and petitions - all of which were in opposition to the Council considering shallow-set longline gear. After public comment, Council members began deliberations on next steps, and it became abundantly clear that there were numerous important unanswered questions, limited available information, and an understanding of the broad scope of opposition from stakeholder groups.

In a significant win for the sportfishing community, the Council voted to not proceed with scoping or consideration of an amendment to authorize shallow-set longline gear in West Coast highly migratory species. The decision to cease consideration of authorizing this gear is a true testament of the ability for a united sportfishing coalition to direct policies impacting our industry.

This is not only a victory for the sportfishing community but also a reminder that when the sportfishing community is organized, thoughtful, and most importantly present at Council meetings - we can successfully advocate for sportfishing interests and responsible resource management.

Also at this same meeting, we have begun the process to further open deeper depths for fishing. We are pushing to open fishing down to 100 fathoms. This will open many more areas for our fleet and private boats to fish and spread out our efforts. We are also trying to get rid of the Cowcod Conservation Area (CCA), Rockfish Conservation Area (RCA), and Jan-Feb time closure for rock fishing because they are not necessary if the stock has been rebuilt. CCA CAL submitted a proposal for and Exempted Fishing Permit to help gain needed data to support our fishing efforts down to the 100 fathoms and into the Cowcod Conservation Area. While we understand this will be a lot of work and expensive, we believe the data is necessary to make informed decisions on catch allocations, bag limits and effect on other species.


CONSERVATION (CONT.)

Other update from PFMC - the testing of drones, and spotter pilots for survey our inshore bait stock assessment have proven valuable and consistently accurate. We are looking forward to updating their stock assessment processes and models to avoid the issues we've had to fight the last few years. We are now working to get them to accurately define the difference between the northern and southern stock of anchovies.

We continue to represent our saltwater anglers and the California Fish & Game Commission and Marine Resources Committee meetings. Our efforts have proven successful as the F&G Commission submitted a letter in support of our efforts at the last PFMC Shallow Set Long Line meeting.

We need to continue to push our angling community to support the CDFW angler surveys. We need more and accurate data of what our private boat fleet are catching. If we don't do better, we will see a push for full electronic reporting, which we do a terrible job in complying with...




DECEMBER GUEST SPEAKER
